Advent 4 - Can We Say 'Yes' to Love



The Jewish Feast of Hanukkah remembers that day when the Temple, the place of God's presence, was finally freed from the desecration and sacrilege inflicted on it by the occupying enemies. The Menorah lamp was lit again for the first time, but with only oil enough for one day. The oil miraculously lasted for eight days. Hence Hanukkah!

How could such tragic sadness and desecration at Bondi Beach on Sunday occur on this feast celebrating liberation and freedom. And yet there were also miracles of courage, self-sacrifice and heroism, by so many who died, were injured, protecting loved ones. Ironical too that we Christians, celebrating the Advent Sunday of Rejoicing, lighting the Candle of Joy on our Advent Wreath, ended our day in such sorrow and shock. Yet the very outpouring of grief, shame, support, bewilderment is itself a much needed reminder of all that is best in our community.

On Sunday, we were all wounded. The attacks on Sunday are not unfamiliar for us - Port Arthur, Lindt Café, Christchurch Mosque. All these attacks foster fear and distress for many of our more recent migrants, refugees and asylum seekers, and especially our Aboriginal sisters and brothers. And for the Jewish community, they tell us, last Sunday was another of the countless 'blows upon a bruise' with which they are too familiar, both the violence itself, and the antisemitism that causes it.

Our words, promises, the resolves made by our governments, do little to ease the grief, or lessen the fear and lack of safety for our Jewish brothers and sisters.

But we want, in some way, to stand beside them, practically, emotionally, spiritually. So, we pray. We grieve. We feel deeply for our Jewish community. We pray for Matilda, Alex and those who died. We pray for those wounded and all their families. And we pray for our whole country with gladness for our big heart, but regret our many divisions and we try to say 'Yes' to love as we celebrate the birth of the Prince of Peace. We sing the carols of His coming, even though, this year our hearts struggle to believe it.

Perhaps this is what Advent really means - our willingness to share in the world's pain and still say 'Yes' to love, - and to Love that was born in Bethlehem. Lighting the fourth Advent Candle, the Candle of Love, takes on a special significance this weekend. Lighting the candle this week is an expression of our longing, our commitment, our promise to try, in our own small ways, to repair a broken world.



In today's Gospel, the Angel Gabriel invites Joseph to take Mary into his home. And not just to protect her from scandal or death. No, this second Annunciation, the Angel asks Joseph to give his heart to the one he loves. He is asked to 'name' Jesus, so that together he and Mary can raise their son to be in fact the Prince of peace. In the shelter of their marriage, Jesus grew in wisdom and maturity, in compassion and courage, in tenderness and truth. Mary and Joseph's love was the tabernacle in which Jesus learned that loves gives and gives till there is nothing left to give; that love holds nothing back, no matter the cost.

Advent this Sunday, asks us to come together and become such a tabernacle of healing, - our families, our parishes, our church. Can we be a tabernacle in which a broken world can be renewed? Especially in the shadow of Bondi, let's hope we can become a shelter where fear is met with tenderness, and wounds are held rather than hidden?

We celebrate at this time the Jewish feast Hannukah and our Christmas feast of Christ - the Light of the World, the Unconquered Sun. Perhaps these words from the poem, *The Hill We Climb*, by Amanda Gorman, the American Poet Laureate are especially apt, especially moving.

*"While we have our eyes on the future,
history has its eyes on us ...
For there is always light,
if only we're brave enough to see it.
if only we're brave enough to be it."*

COMMUNION UNDER BOTH KINDS

The liturgy is most effective when we come to it with the proper disposition. Let us consider the elements of the communion rite that lead us to receive the Body and Blood of the Lord and come into union with Christ and one another.

The Lord's Prayer

The communion rite begins with the introduction to the Lord's Prayer. Here we call upon God as children asking "Our Father" for the food to sustain us from day to day. We also pray for forgiveness from sin so that we who will receive holy things can also become holy. The prayer concludes with a plea for deliverance from whatever separates us from God's love, a love made manifest in the Eucharist.

Sign of Peace

In this ritual, the Church asks for peace and unity within the Church and for all humanity. It is a symbol of reconciliation and unity between the Body of Christ. Then the Church asks us to express our ecclesial communion and mutual charity with one another before receiving the Sacrament. The words we say are the same as Jesus' first words to the Apostles, "Peace be with you". The liturgy invites us in this way to be Christ to one another. Only after we share in the peace that Christ offers are we ready to approach the altar and share in the meal.

To be able to reintroduce Communion under both kinds we, firstly, need to have people willing to be Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion (EOMHC). If you have thought about joining this ministry and want a few more details, then please speak to the priest after Mass or contact the Parish Office.

And secondly, have all our EOMHC trained in the reintroduction of the Chalice, have a Working With Children Check (WWCC) and completed Safeguarding Essentials Training (was known as Safe Environments for All/ SEFA training). Once these have been completed all EOMHC will then be mandated with the Adelaide Archdiocese.
